

Solly's Law will fill gaps in NC law

- Raise the legal age for sale of tobacco products in NC from 18 to 21 to align with federal law (2019 Congress passed law to raise federal sales age to 21)
- Establish a license for tobacco retailers, which will allow law enforcement to hold predatory sellers accountable

 NC is one of 7 states that has not raised the age

 NC Is one of 9 states that does not require a license to sell vapes and tobacco

Why This Matters

- Financial Consequences:
 - N.C. risks losing \$5 million in block grant funding for prevention, treatment, and recovery services.
 - Federal enforcement begins December 2025.
- · Youth Tobacco Use is Rising:
 - North Carolina has seen a sharp increase in youth tobacco use, particularly e-cigarettes.
 - North Carolina ranks 6th in the nation for youth vaping
- Early Addiction is Common: 95% of tobacco users start before age 21.
- Lack of Licensing: N.C. is one of only 9 states without a tobacco retailer licensing system.
- Licensing Protects Communities:
 - Tracks where tobacco products are sold
 - Holds non-compliant retailers accountable, protecting law-abiding businesses.
- Prevents Youth Nicotine Addiction: Helps curb e-cigarette and nicotine product use in schools.
- · Aligns State & Federal Law:
 - The federal minimum tobacco sales age was raised to 21 in December 2019.
 - As of October 2024, 43 states have aligned with federal law—N.C. has not.

Proposed Legislation Will

- · Raise the Minimum Age:
 - Prohibits the sale of tobacco products by individuals under 21.
- Requires proof of age for all tobacco sales.
- Establish a Tobacco Sales Permit
 System: Retailers must obtain a permit
 from the N.C. Alcoholic Beverage
 Control (ABC) Commission to sell
 tobacco legally.
- Strengthen Enforcement:
 - ABC Commission gains authority to issue permits, impose sanctions, and enforce laws in collaboration with the Alcohol Law Enforcement (ALE) Division.
 - ALE agents and Commission employees can investigate and inspect tobacco retail locations.
- Increase Compliance Requirements: Retailers must display signage stating:
 - "NC Law PROHIBITS the sale of tobacco products, vapor products, and components by persons under 21. Proof of age required."
- Set Legal Penalties: Class 2 misdemeanor for selling or assisting in selling tobacco to anyone under 21.





I lost my son to vaping; let's protect others

celebrated his 17th birthday on June 5. Instead of buying him a present, I was in Raleigh asking lawmakers to protect North Carolina youth from vaping and nicotine.

My son died on Saturday, June 17,

2023, because of vaping. Since Solomon's death I have devoted my life to advocating for the health and safety of children in North Carolina, including working to get Solly's Law (HB 430 and SB 318) passed.

Solly's Law was introduced on March 19 with bipartisan support to

raise the sales age of vapes and nicotine to 21, and to require that tobacco be permitted as alcohol is, so there are consequences to shops that sell to underage kids. Hundreds of health, education, county and town, and law enforcement boards have endorsed this legislation.

Unfortunately, this commonsense bill has been stuck and has yet to have a hearing. Every moment this bill is de-

laved, more kids get sick and more kids will become addicted to devastating effects of nicotine.

Solomon got sick in March of 2023. We were shocked to learn he had been vaping. He went from being a healthy member of the New Hanover High School football team with no underlying health issues to a very sick teenager almost overnight. Solomon was diagnosed with "Popcorn Lungs," which caused air hunger and shortness of breath without

Solomon enjoyed the things that most teenage boys like, sports, hanging out with friends, playing video games, riding important, that will not be enough. The his bike, etc. His favorite thing was going to the gym with his dad on Saturday mornings. Because of vaping, there were states that the not raised the age to sell many days he didn't have the strength to walk from the house to the bus stop. much less be a typical teenage boy or go to the gym with this dad.

On Friday, June 16, 2023, Solomon collapsed at home. His father and EMTs had to give our son CPR. Unfortunately. by the time EMTs stabilized Solomon to transport him to the hospital, his body had suffered too much damage to survive. The lack of oxygen to his organs caused irreversible hypoxia, which resulted in Solomon's death. Had my son not collapsed the day he did, he would have needed a heart and lung transplant

Vapes and other nicotine products should not be available to underage kids. Solly's Law has the vital key elements that would increase the age to purchase vape and nicotine products to 21, put retail permitting in place which would

allow law enforcement to be able to do something for the bad actors who sell to underage kids. While education is best way is to strengthen our laws.

vapor and tine. In addition, we are one of eight states that have not set up a retail permitting system. Vaping and nicotine products are gateways to a lifetime of addiction. We need to show the children of North Carolina that we care, we need to protect their future, keep them safe, allow them to experience the things Solomon will not have the opportunity to do.

I ask our North Carolina leaders to put kids before the vape and tobacco industries and give Solly's Law a hearing. The bill needs to be passed and sent to the governor to be signed into law.

Together we can protect our youth, so that no other family ever has to lose a child the way we lost Solly.


